## How Fearing God Can Lead to a Life of Peace and Contentment

If you know Jesus, he should terrify you; not because of the reasons you might be thinking. A couple of generations ago Sisters “so and so” and Fathers “so and so” may have tried to scare you into believing in Jesus with the threat of hell. Don’t get me wrong, hell – a state of eternal separation from Jesus – is real. Jesus speaks about hell quite clearly. However, hell ought not be our primary motivation for believing in Jesus. It leads to a faith based on utility, not one based on authentic love. Fear of hell tends to result in treating Jesus like tyrant who always needs to be pleased. On the other hand, fear of Jesus can lead to conversion of heart. Fear can lead us to “wake up and smell the coffee” per se.

### Fearing Change

An encounter with Jesus is scary. I remember when I first encountered Jesus in university I was challenged to discard many beliefs and most importantly confess my sins. No excuses. Just all out in the open. It’s not about me anymore, it’s all about Jesus, even if there is a price to pay. This is the kind of fear King Herod is faced with. Herod knew of the prophecies that a new king will be born for Israel so he began to fear losing his power to this new born king. Instead of patiently waiting to see the new life this boy had to offer him, his fear drew him into a tyrannical hissy fit, killing innocent newborn children in Judea. When I was a child I threw countless hissy-fits out of fear of not getting my way, but I was never able to “win” against my parents. Arguing with God is just delaying the inevitable; a call to conversion.

### We all need motivation

Fear can also be a great motivator for good. My grandfather once revealed to me that he used to be a chain smoker in his younger years. He was also a competitive swimmer. Upon realizing that the smoking was threatening his health he instantly stopped. My grandpa feared missing out on living a healthy life with his family. Similarly, my fear lies in missing out on the life that God has planned for me. Moreover, I feared Jesus because I did not want to change. I felt comfortable thinking I had everything figured out. I had control. Once I overcame the fear of letting go of control it was liberating. I still don’t have everything figured out, but I know Jesus does (since he’s God), so I know he’s got my back. I got nothing to fear.
