**The Sacraments our "Lifeline"  
for a Time of Crisis**

In the past few weeks, our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) group has been reading the story of Creation in the book of Genesis, where we hear how God saw that all creation was good. "God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good." (Gen.1:31) Then someone asked, "If all that was created was good, then why do we have suffering and pain?" Later in Genesis, we hear how man falls prey to temptation but God does not abandon him. God loves us as we are. God's love and mercy is immeasurable, unlimited and unceasing. We do not earn God's love and it is not offered because we are worthy. God just loves us. It is hard for us to believe this.

I was reflecting on this passage as I sat down to write this column for the bulletin. I too, like so many other Catholics have been struggling with the news and publicity about the sexual abuse of innocent children and the large number of victims. I was angry and ashamed for the church. I too feel the pain of the survivors of abuse and the betrayal. Our Church is broken and suffering, there is no doubt. The faithful are distraught, grieved and angry. They feel betrayed, ashamed and skeptical that anything has been done since the reforms adopted in 2002. One may ask, "Where is God in all this mess?"

In the Catholic Register, Bob Brehl, quotes Fr. Robert Barron stating, "We are not Catholics because of the moral excellence of our leaders. We're Catholics because of Jesus Christ, crucified and raised from the dead. We're Catholics because of the Trinitarian love of God. We're Catholics because of the mystical Body of Christ. We're Catholics because of the sacraments. We're Catholics especially because of the Eucharist." (Catholic Register, Sept. 8, 2018) Whenever I find myself in a crisis, I turn to prayer and the Sacraments, especially the Sacrament of the Eucharist. I turn to the Gospels and the life of Jesus. I look to the examples given to us by Jesus and ask myself, "What would Jesus do in this situation?" I always find that, prayer and reflection on the Gospels has the ability to bring me clarity of thought and to restore peace within. In this situation, we repeatedly see Jesus being grieved and express righteous anger when confronted with wrong attitudes and 'hardness of hearts' of those before Him. We read in the Gospel of Mark, "He looked around at them with anger" (Mark 3:5) As Christians and members of the Body of Christ, we should be angry when faced with sinful action taking place by those who are religious leaders. It is our duty to pray for and to hold those in power accountable for their actions while seeking reform to make sure that this does not happen again. Jesus did become angry yet His anger was not an excuse for sinful actions.
