


**Teach me

The point of the command is to acknowledge people and their needs over the satisfaction provided by the ownership of things.

**MOSAIC INTERFAITH**  
**PEACE MEAL**

MOSAIC INTERFAITH was founded in 1980 and is made up of congregations representing Buddhism, Christianity, Hinduism, Islam, Judaism, Sikhism and Zoroastrianism. MOSAIC Interfaith is dedicated to dialogue – to the promotion of mutual respect and understanding among religions, with the hope that all may co-exist in peace.

The Vatican II document *Nostra Aetate* (Declaration on the Relation of the church to Non-Christian Religions) turned around centuries of disregard and disrespect of other faith traditions. For the first time the Catholic Church conceded that much truth is to be found and respected in other religions and formally expressed appreciation for the merits of non-Christian religions. With this document the Church began to rethink its relationship to the world religions, stressing the truths and values that it shares with other religions, rather than the differences that separates it from them.

There are many ways to practice interfaith dialogue. There is *theological exchange*. There is the *dialogue of social action*, Christians and those of other faiths working together on justice issues. The most important form of dialogue is *the dialogue of everyday life* - trying to get to know **one another in everyday life – in our workplaces, in our neighbourhoods** etc. The *dialogue of everyday life* lies at heart of developing good relationships with people of other faiths. In the end we make a choice. We can regard the differences between religions as their most important feature, or we can recognize that beyond the diversity there is an essence that all religions share – love, compassion, forgiveness. This is what binds us together and transcends our differences.

Pope John Paul II has stated: **“By dialogue we let God be present in our midst, for as we open ourselves to one another, we open ourselves to God.”** Today interfaith dialogue is considered to be a mission of the church – not to convert but to dialogue - to respect, value and learn from one another. This is what the Peace Meal tries to foster – an opportunity to come to know each other, to break down the stereotypes so that the other is no longer a stranger.

## CANADIAN BISHOPS ISSUE DOCUMENT ON PROTECTION OF MINORS AND VULNERABLE ADULTS

On October 4, the bishops of Canada issued a new national guidelines for the protection of minors in Canada. Entitled Protecting Minors from Sexual Abuse: A Call to the Catholic Faithful in Canada for Healing, Reconciliation and Transformation, this document first and foremost, focuses on minors and vulnerable adults, whom Canada's bishops wish to protect from sexual violence.
