


Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time



There is no story in the scriptures, which so poignantly points out human ingratitude as that of the **Ten Lepers** who came to Jesus desperately longing to be cured of their loathsome disease. They begged for mercy but when the crisis passed, they saw things differently. Jesus was tapping deeply into ordinary human emotions when he uttered those heartbreak words: “Were not ten made clean?” The other nine, where are they?” He was obviously troubled by their lack of appreciation. We might well wonder what the reason for such a display of ungratefulness was. Why is saying “Thank you” such a problem? Maybe the lepers were so excited at being back in society that they forgot the one who heard their cry of distress and cured them. Perhaps they thought that Jesus was just doing his job as a healer and took their cure for granted. Whatever the reason, their display of ingratitude diminished them as individuals. They also missed the deep inner peace and joy that comes from giving thanks.

Jean Baptiste Massieu, the famous deaf educator, made a statement that is now considered a French proverb. He said, "Gratitude is the memory of the heart."
