On this Third Sunday of Advent, also known as Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday, it is a time to light the pink candle on the advent wreath. This day reminds us of the joy that is to come and the hope we have as we await the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. The readings for Gaudete Sunday deal with rejoicing in the Lord as well as the mission of John the Baptist and his connection with Advent.

In his 2014 Gaudete Sunday homily, Pope Francis said that Gaudete Sunday is known as the "Sunday of Joy", and that instead of fretting about "all they still haven't" done to prepare for Christmas, people should "think of all the good things life has given you."

The theologian Henri Nouwen writes that joy is not the same as happiness. We can be unhappy about many things, but joy can still be there because it comes from the knowledge of God's unconditional love for us. Joy does not simply happen to us, it is a choice we make every day based on the knowledge that we belong to God and have found God in our refuge and our safety and that nothing, not even death, can take God away from us.

Il Presepio / The Christmas Manger

In the 13th century, Saint Francis of Assisi originated the practice of depicting the Nativity scene. Francis wanted to bring to life the story of the birth of Baby Jesus. Prior to that time, there were paintings of the Nativity known from as far back as the year 380 C.E. But Francis wanted to recreate in a natural environment the scene of the birth of Christ in Bethlehem with real live characters of his time. He invited people to participate and to recreate the scene. In a little town of Greccio, Francis built a stable with a manger and some straw. He added a living Madonna, Joseph and shepherds. He had actual live cattle, sheep and donkeys; the animals that, as the story goes, once warmed the infant Jesus with their breath.

This tradition continues to this day in some churches throughout Italy. They are called "Presepi viventi" or "Living Mangers or Creches". It can be as simple as a stable with only the major figures or as elaborate as with all the live animals, shepherds and Magi. However, most common in today's homes, the Presepio or Mangers are recreated by using a small wooden stable and small-painted plastic figurines.

In some homes in Italy, the manger scene serves as the center of the family Christmas tradition and children play an important part in setting up the manger. For some, this is an annual ritual of unpacking the statues, tell a story about the figures unpacked, such as the shepherd with his sheep, and remember what he was doing on that special night so many years ago when they heard Angels singing with the good news of the birth of a child. Or of the Magi who followed the star from their own far away land to Bethlehem. In any culture at Christmas, however, it is the heart and the spirit that must prepare to receive the newness of Jesus. Advent gives us a chance to clean our spiritual house, and eliminate the excesses and ugliness so that we can be clean and open to God's Word. What needs to be removed or cleansed in our hearts and lives so Jesus can be welcomed in our hearts and home? The Manger is where Jesus was born, and we are the mangers where he lives.

One activity for the family can be setting up a manger scene together. Having the children help with putting together the Nativity Scene and at the same time talk about each figure and its significance to the Nativity. Encouraging the children to talk about the role that each character played, how they may have felt, and where they fit in the overall picture. And if Jesus was born today, who might be in the Nativity scene and why? Place the manger in a prominent place in your home and gather to pray over the manger *Adapted from Camels, Carols, Crosses and Crowns by Shiela Kielly and Sheila Geraghty*
