Being "Salt and Light"

As we reflected on the scripture passages in our RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults) for this coming Sunday, I encouraged the group with the usual words, "What word or phrase catches your attention? Or perhaps a few paragraphs together, or even the whole scene? How is it speaking to you? What if Jesus has just told that to you directly? What does it tell you about yourself and God?" Here are a few reflections shared.

In Matthew's Gospel, we hear Jesus saying that *we are* "the salt of the earth" and "the light of the world". And being salt and light is not optional. Jesus did not say you can be...or you have the potential to be...He said you are.

There you have it! It is pretty straight forward. It is about our identity. It is about who we are. This Sunday's gospel is a continuation of The Beatitudes from the Sermon on the Mount. In this gospel, Jesus gives us two of the most useful metaphors we have to guide our lives as Christians.

What is so special about salt that caused Jesus to use it in this context? In Jesus' time salt was very important and of great value. Roman soldiers received their wages in salt. Greeks considered salt to be divine. Salt was important for survival. People were dependent on salt to preserve their food. It was the only way they had to preserve meat and stop the process of decay. It also enhanced texture and most important the flavour of the food. By being salt, what is Jesus asking us to do? Perhaps we are being called to preserve and keep alive the faith and love of God. Perhaps as salt creates thirst, we are called to create a thirst for Christ and a thirst for a way of living as shown to us by Jesus. Salt was indispensable as we are in God's eyes.

We are also told, "You are the light of the world". As "light", we are called to shine and brighten the world around us with acts of goodness and love. We are called to illuminate or make visible God's presence in our lives and the world around us. As "light", we enable those around us to see God at work in the world. I was reading Aered Rosser's reflection about the difference between a mirror and a lamp. A mirror held up to reality adds nothing to it but reflects only what is before it. A lamp held up to reality adds detail, adding variation in its color and brightening it with warmth. We are clearly meant to be lamps and not mirrors! (Aelred Rosser Workbook for lectors & gospel readers)

Anthony De Mello has a story about discovering who we are. "A salt doll journeyed for thousands of miles over land, until it finally came to the sea. It was fascinated by this strange moving mass, quite unlike anything it had ever seen before. "Who are you?" said the salt doll to the sea. The sea smilingly replied, "Come in and see." So the doll waded in. The farther it walked into the sea the more it dissolved, until there was only very little of it left. Before that last bit dissolved, the doll exclaimed in wonder, "Now I know what I am!""


