

Today we enter Holy Week, the most sacred time in the church year with **Palm Sunday** and Christ's triumphant entry on a humble donkey into Jerusalem. He is openly proclaimed as the Messiah by an enthusiastic throng of followers in festive moods, waving palms and carpeting his pathway with their clothing. This week swings from one extreme to the other and Christ has no illusions about this fickle crowd because as the week unfolds, the palm branches will shape themselves into crosses and the Hosannas will become jeers of a treacherous mob calling for his death. The voices that shout Hosannas become cries of hatred and despair as Jesus exchanges his donkey ride for a nightmare trip on a wooden cross.

The story of the passion speaks for itself and its presentation is simple and direct. In it, we glimpse the presence of the contradictory in our lives. As we travel along the road with Jesus and encounter all the people he meets, we live the events and have an opportunity to enter into the sufferings of Christ during his last days on each. The people involved in his death are so like us that we can identify with this. There is no role in the drama that we are not capable of playing. We must never forget that each of us has a hand in Jesus' death when we hurt others through gossip, slander, degrading or treating someone unjustly. The cross is lifted up as a sign of Christ taking the sins of humanity upon himself in order to soften our hearts, by revealing the depth of his perfect love.

Hosanna in the Highest

As we begin this holiest of all weeks in our Christian calendar we begin with the crowds on the outskirts of Jerusalem. We join the people as we lay our cloaks and branches on the road to warmly welcome Jesus into the city. We wave our palms and shout out, 'Hosanna' as we do each Mass before the Eucharistic prayer welcoming Jesus into our church and into our hearts.

Hosanna is a Hebrew word which means: 'Save us now'. It is interesting that at the start of Holy Week the crowds are welcoming and chanting: "Save us now," and just a few days later we see them chanting: "Crucify him, crucify him!" Surely our relationship with God isn't so fickle, is it?

Though our faith may not be as fickle as the crowds it is true that we can be easily swayed with them, one minute welcoming Jesus and the next crucifying him with our words and actions. This is why we are so blessed to have such a wonderful place like St. Luke's where we can reorient ourselves and gather with the crowds chanting: 'Hosanna' instead of 'Crucify'. When we sing the Holy, Holy I always find it helpful to imagine Jesus once again riding on the donkey into our church and taking his place at the altar.

As Jesus enters the city in today's Gospel it is interesting to note the perspective we take in the scene. I have always taken the perspective of one looking on cheering loudly and welcoming Jesus as he enters. I have a deep sense of gratitude and compassion for him, aware of what he must face over the coming week leading to his death.

But more and more I have been reflecting where Jesus wants me to be. Off to the side and cheering him on or riding beside him on the colt he has brought along. The same can be said within the Mass. Do I join Christ on the altar offering my body and blood for the salvation of the world or do I remain in the pew observing the unfolding scene.

Just last week we saw Jesus weeping, greatly disturbed by the people's lack of faith when he raised Lazarus. Perhaps he was wondering if his followers would ever get the message and exhibit the faith, he was hoping to enkindle in them. Perhaps this week we can take that extra step and ride with Jesus as he enters the city echoing Thomas' prophetic words: "Let us also go, that we may die with him," carrying our crosses and joining him on the altar as a perfect sacrifice for the sins of the world.
