We can be generous to the poor and the oppressed, to our neighbours and to the old, simply because Christ has been so kind to us who have deserved nothing. Ours is a life made new by the Risen Lord. We are children of the resurrection.

Sleeping with Bread

During the bombing raids of World War II, thousands of children were orphaned and left to starve. The fortunate ones were rescued and placed in refugee camps where they received food and good care. But many of these children who had lost so much could not sleep at night. They feared waking up to find once again they were homeless and without food. Nothing seemed to reassure them. Finally, someone hit upon the idea of giving each child a piece of bread to hold at bedtime. Holding their bread, these children could finally sleep in peace. All through the night the bread reminded them: "Today I ate, and I will eat again tomorrow."

We see a similar thing occur in our Gospel this weekend. After all the trauma of Jesus' passion, death and resurrection Peter and the other disciples were confused, scared and unsure of what to do so they returned to something that was familiar and comforting to them, fishing. An activity they didn't have to think about, paid their bills and assured that they would eat today and again tomorrow or so they hoped.

Jesus aware of the apostles' fears and reluctance to move from fish to faith appears to them from the shore just after daybreak after a night of catching nothing. He multiplies the fish yet again assuring them they can have faith that he will always take care of their physical and spiritual needs with fish for the physical and bread for the spiritual.

When I struggle and feel myself resorting to past comforts to ease my anxiety, I try to find Jesus at work in my life and I never have to look very far. A simple reflection on the previous day reveals God's presence in numerous ways. One special feast I will draw on for a long time is the recent Easter Vigil at St. Luke's. A marathon of sorts with all the essential readings and psalms of our faith history enriched with the shining glory of more than 20 newly baptized it was an extraordinary taste of the heavenly banquet.

One encounter comes to mind was with a parishioner who was baptised just last year. Chatting with him following the Mass his eyes shined so brightly, and he was so full of happiness. I thought to myself where else do you to find such unbridled joy in a person. He hadn't won a lottery, taken a fancy vacation or been promoted at work, he simply had sat on a hard wooden bench for 3 hours, yet his ineffable glow was otherworldly.

Thomas Wolfe was right 'we can't go home again', unless our home is the Holy Mass where heaven and earth intersect with God making all things new time and time again feeding us with fish and bread. Yes Lord, we love you, humbly bless us with the grace to feed your lambs and sheep forever. Amen. John Humphries.
